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**YEAR IN REVIEW: 2018 - 2019** 

This has been a year of connection and commitment.

- Since July 1, 2018, we have celebrated **25 new members**, and now serve a population of **295 adult members and an additional 100\* friends, participants and attendees**. This is an increase of 3% over last year at this time. We welcomed many visitors as well, adding over 50 to our list who now receive our weekly announcements.
- Our Worship Services were attended by **an average 200 people per week;** we introduced four intentional multigenerational services, worship was led once by the Youth Group, and six times by lay leadership, four of which were in the summer. Five new choir members and six new musicians enhanced our Sunday experience.
- Welcome Table Wednesdays were introduced to a surprising and enthusiastic response, averaging 80 attendees each month for both the meal and spiritual program. This does not include 44 attendees for a special Blue Christmas service. Clearly identifying and fulfilling a need within the community, Welcome Table Wednesdays often served as another worship opportunity, most notably for those who are unable to attend Sunday mornings. Congregants and the staff were stretched creatively and spiritually.
- Faithful to our **Personnel Strategic Plan**, we embarked on a bold but need-based Stewardship Campaign. We now plan to welcome a half time Assistant Minister, extend the hours and responsibility of our Church Administrator to reflect a Congregational Administrator's portfolio, and prepare for Rev. Kim's first sabbatical in 2020.
- Our Capital Campaign raised over \$920,000 to date, just shy of our goal of \$1.1 million; over 35% of this has been collected. Surveys have been done, architect conceptual plans have been reviewed, and we now begin work with the township on approvals.
  - \* Friends are those who give financially to the congregation on an on-going basis but who have not signed the membership book. Participants are typically getting to know the congregation. They do not yet financially sustain the community but participate in Adult or Children's RE, receive pastoral care, and often attend worship. Most participants are somewhere along the path to membership. Attendees are more frequent than visitors but are not involved in congregational life beyond Sunday morning.
- One year ago UUCWC became one of the first adopters of the 8<sup>th</sup> Principle. The Board of Trustees set forth to institutionalize this Principle through their annual goals, passing motions that set a standard for an anti-oppression lens in everything from purchasing to evaluations to governance structure. The Racial Justice Initiative asked each Committee and Ministry to embark on a self-audit of how they function in light of the 8<sup>th</sup> Principle, helping leaders throughout the congregation grow in our accountability to one another and our faith. Through classes, small groups, outside speakers and more, we deepened our commitment to this work as individuals and as a community.

#### There were other connections this year:

- Our Ministerial Resident, Hannah Gallo, learned and led in important and lasting ways;
- Robin Pugh, DLRE, completed her 10<sup>th</sup> year at UUCWC;
- Steve Ryan joined the Music Ministry as our new pianist.

And still there was more. Our work and our relationships are bound in our mission, to Create Community, Celebrate Life, and Change the world.

#### **Create Community**

This year, we introduced **Welcome Table Wednesdays**, a monthly gathering to feed the body and the spirit with communal meals and compelling programming. Our **potlucks** continued to give members and friends opportunities to journey together outside of UUCWC. **Community Building Ministry** kept our spirits up with a welcome back picnic, a chili cook-off, and a swing dance concert and social dance. Our **Membership Ministry** fostered the *Growth Through Service Initiative*, which will bring service opportunities to our members that are fulfilling, feed your passions and grow your soul, while also maintaining our Faith Forward curriculum each Sunday. The **Inclusion Team** explored how well the church community was doing in keeping its older members connected and included in the life of the church and made recommendations; all of the recommendations have had action taken. Previous pianist, Erin Busch, created a concert series bringing excellent music and over \$1,000 in funds to the church.

#### **Celebrate Life**

We said **goodbye** to too many beloved members: Bill Cox, Jeana Bateman, Paul Tuerff, Jane Shafer and Karen Krohnemann, and we recognized the passing of Marilyn Cichowski's wife, Michele Touvelle. We **dedicated** Liam de Barra and Malcolm Allistair Wildszewski. Our **Pastoral Care Ministry** nurtured, cared for and assisted members in need, with over 100 people offering help through *Lotsa Helping Hands*, and supporting five members with meals, transportation and other services; Pastoral Care also formed a support group for those dealing with grief, anxiety and depression. **Kinship Circles** offered its ministry of building intentional, multi-generational families. **Archives Team** continued preserving our stories, sharing them with our youth and improving storage of materials. Our **Music Ministry** welcomed a new pianist, five new members, and six new musicians, while participating in a choral workshop, music festival and outreach performance at an assisted living facility. It takes many people to work collaboratively to provide meaningful **Sunday Services** in line with our monthly themes. These include, our Choir, Pianist, Director of Music Ministry, Worship and Story Associates, Intern, DLRE, guest speakers and musicians, and Sound Team.

#### **Change the World** within our walls

**Our Parking Task Force** brought to completion the long awaited parking expansion, with the financial support needed from Capital Campaign funds. **The Grounds Committee** contracted

for lawn maintenance as well as snow removal, and carried out a grounds clean-up and shed clean-out. **Our Building Committee** installed carbon monoxide detectors throughout the building, navigated a major plumbing problem and restoration on the lower level as well as executed minor maintenance issues. Our building itself was used 15% more compared to last year, with 8% higher usage during daytime hours. In the Sanctuary, our Sound Team helped install a new projector and sound system, which was brought into regular use by the **Worship Associates. Earth Ministry** participated in a neighborhood clean-up, continued to offer used book and organic product sales that provide our Fellowship Hour coffee, and planted organic vegetables in Allie's Garden, feeding our HomeFront students. They also supported the non-profit ISLES, a group which fosters gardening and provides seeds (among other Trenton-area needs), in furtherance of our 8th principle.

Our **Finance Committee** indicated that our finances continue to be strong. **Auction** profits this year exceeded \$47,000, including a carryover from last year; this is \$7,000 more than the targeted amount for this fiscal year. As approved at last year's annual meeting, half of this surplus will go to social justice causes, to be distributed by the Council for Faith in Action. We also raised over \$5,500 in other fundraising efforts such as the Craft Fair and plant sales, while concerts and airport transportation brought in over \$2,500. **Stewardship** raised awareness about giving levels and need, bringing in pledges of almost \$400,000 to fund our operating budget and over \$40,000 in increased/new pledges. Through the *Wake Now Our Vision* bequest program introduced by our **Endowment Committee**, UUCWC will receive \$13,700 in matching funds from the UU Congregation at Shelter Rock. Our **Capital Campaign** raised over \$920,000 to date. Surveys have been done, preliminary conceptual plans from the architect have been reviewed; our engineering consultants have begun the work to obtain township planning board approvals. **Nominating Committee** navigated the perfect storm, and provided exciting recommendations for election for a Board President, Treasurer, Finance Chair, Stewardship Chair and Endowment Chair.

#### **Change the World** outside our walls

The Council for Faith in Action, through our 50% of the plate funding, disbursed funds to over fifteen organizations as part of our social action. A new Faith Action Ministry helped 189 congregants make 1,386 elected official contacts at the Action Table and represented UUCWC at over twelve protests, rallies, anti-racism conferences and workshops. The Racial Justice Initiative organized a self-audit for groups within UUCWC of how they function in light of the 8th Principle, helping leaders throughout the congregation grow in our accountability to one another and our faith. UUCWC continued its work with HomeFront students in tutoring and sharing meals, a holiday craft fair and holiday party. Food Ministry prepared over 3,000 meals this year, and developed a closer relationship through direct contact with meal recipients. Through Denominational Affairs we continued to connect with the Unitarian Universalist Association through participation in, and scholarships for, General Assembly.

#### **Change the World** within ourselves

**Adult Religious Education (ARE)** offered 23 classes led by 30 facilitators serving 145 participants. **Children's Religious Education (RE)** field tested the UUA's "Dismantling White

Supremacy Accountability Assessment for RE programs," resulting in seven new goals for Children's RE next year. Our **Intern Support Committee** encouraged and assisted our second intern in the sometimes challenging work of UUCWC. Our **Right Relations Committee** helped us navigate difficult passages and uphold our covenant with each other along the way.

#### REPORT OF THE UUCWC BOARD OF TRUSTEES FOR THE 2018-2019 CHURCH YEAR

Our Board of Trustees is the nine-person elected governing body of this religious community. The Board's governance philosophy delegates decision-making authority to individual ministries and committees so it can focus on:

- Financial stewardship
- Goal-Setting and implementing the Strategic Plan
- Creating and overseeing Church Policies
- Overseeing Personnel and Staffing

The board meets monthly on the second Wednesday of the month, our Executive team meets monthly in between the full board meetings, and we offer monthly Board Chats during Middle Hour. The Vice-President holds quarterly Council meetings with church leaders. Four board members regularly attend other committee meetings serving as board liaisons. Twice a year we hold a day-long board retreat on a Saturday to set goals for the year and then reflect on those goals. We are committed to our work.

I was reminded by the Right Relations Committee service last week just how much we come to this building, our home, to be nourished and to nourish others – every time we walk through those doors. And so it is being a board member – it is both practical work and a spiritual practice. As is custom, we light a chalice and hear a check in from the board members and attending staff, usually Rev. Kim, Robin Pugh, Susan Irgang and Hannah Gallo. Every meeting we keep our mission and covenant and goals top of mind as we move through our agenda. This year we have asked hard questions about how we understand our strategic role and how we should best function for the congregation. Our discussions are ethical, theological, and etymological (words matter and can carry a lot of baggage!)…we dive deep and we laugh a lot. We hold challenging discussions and make tough decisions that can result in surprising or even unpopular decisions but which can lead to unexpected or amazing results.

This year at our fall retreat we established four goals under the over-arching theme of Enhance Ownership and Engagement:

- 1. Support the Capital Project
- 2. Institutionalize the 8th Principle
- 3. Nurture Leadership
- 4. Cultivate a Growth Mindset in all that we do

As a strategic board, it can be difficult to point to any one thing and say "We made that happen!" Committees, ministries, the staff and individuals – YOU – make these goals reality after the board sets them in motion. So I am going to highlight some of YOUR results with the pride and gratitude of someone who knows they are a small part of a much greater whole.

The Board supports the Capital Project by being in communication about ongoing activities and decisions. Continuing with their charge the team interviewed and selected the best architect to meet our needs. His knowledge of the intricacies of NJ building codes and experience with

designing for non-profits is extremely helpful. His preliminary plans meet many of our expectations for an improved space – but it is was the addition of the green, living archway in front of the building that told me this architect understands that this place is our home. Well done, Capital Project Team!

The Board is working on institutionalizing the 8th Principle by looking at its own practices and policies as well as supporting the Rational Justice Initiative in its work. This year we passed a motion stating: The Board respectfully requests that all committees, ministries, and staff, when considering engaging outside vendors or contractors, make a conscious effort to find and solicit vendors who are in a category that honors our 8th Principle: specifically, vendors who are people of color and other oppressed groups.

The Capital Project led in this effort by searching out architectural firms run by women and/or people of color and reaching out to them. However, none of them were able to take our project on due to their own full schedules. Thank you for being leaders in this, Capital Project Team.

Last year, the Board wrote a set of guidelines for groups to help incorporate a social justice lens when planning an event, meeting or activity. There was some hard, dedicated work by one group who used it last spring. This fall RJI reached out to all church groups and asked them to discuss three questions surrounding the 8th principle, as it is understood in their group. Food Ministry referred to the board's guidelines to help them construct a conversation to answer the questions. The summary they gave at Council of that conversation was revelatory and beautiful and has already made their strong ministry even stronger. So, thank you RJI and thank you, Food Ministry.

Nurturing leadership in a community of diverse volunteers isn't easy. The Bylaws Task Force appointed by the Board is a successful example of matching the right task with the right committed people and encouraging shared leadership. This group brilliantly pooled their knowledge, skills and curiosity to develop a more coherent and consistent document that I hope you are proud to vote for later in the meeting. "Who knew bylaws could be so much fun?!"

The board has enthusiastically supported the efforts of Liz and Brandon Rodenburg, originally of the Membership Committee, as they learned about Growth through Service, a program that identifies members' passions and matches them with open volunteer opportunities on a churchwide scale.

Their pilot program initiated this spring with a few trained interviewers and a variety of church leaders should inform them how to move forward and possibly pave the way for an assistant minister to more readily assist with Leadership Training. Thank you for your persistence and commitment, Liz and Brandon.

Utilizing the current structure of Council meetings, Rev. Kim and Nathalie Edmond have partnered to sustain the engagement of existing leaders. Higher-level programming aligned with the goals of UUCWC has fostered deep conversations and encouraged committees and ministries to participate in the larger work of the church. Thank you, Kim and Nathalie.

This spring it became very clear to the board that we needed to grow our staff. Our successful stewardship campaign took us closer to that possibility than we've ever been before. So, even though we would need to dip deeply into our robust reserve funds, the board approved a budget that included increasing our congregational manager position to full time and adding a half-time assistant minister. It was a well-considered, slightly terrifying leap of faith informed by our growth mindset. And then, something amazing happened ...the universe provided...or rather, promises were generously kept, grant monies came in, and...through the hard work of many people we are being asked to approve a nearly balanced budget today. Thank you, all, who made that happen.

Dear people of UUCWC – I hope you hear what I am saying – that because of YOU our union-our institution-our community is strong and our future is bright!

Being President of the Board these past two years has been challenging and rewarding – self-affirming and humbling. I thank the board for their commitment and laughter, I thank the staff for their wisdom and support, and I thank you all for the opportunity and honor to serve you in this capacity.

- Increased high quality programming offered by our talented members
- 15 people completed Wellspring 1 this year. Wellspring is an intentional year-long spiritual deepening course. Wellspring 1 is a prerequisite to all other wellspring classes.
- 12 people took "Living the 8<sup>th</sup> principle", a one year book discussion class to transform people from the inside out
- 15 people took Hannah Gallo's class on grief, "Giving Sorrow Words"

The Archives is vitally important to our church because we have such rich history. We have been working to organize documents, photos, and other items into accessible information that is used regularly for history displays, written articles, and for committee or personal research. We have regular visitors and volunteers from the congregation who want to know about UUCWC's community and how we work together to change the world and celebrate the joys and sorrows of life together. Our team works to help people find the information or photographs they are looking for and fill in the blanks of why, who, what, and when in UUCWC's past.

#### Success(es) from the past year

- Moved more documents into archives quality boxes and folders
- Continued to weed and organize papers concerning the congregational history, endowment, social action work, biographic profiles, orders of service, newsletters, and committee work
- Continued to organize, identify, accession, and catalog photos according to dates and activities with the help of Betsy Young and Ronnie Dobrowolski
- Continued work on digital catalog for photos, having cataloged over 650 items and have finished cataloging photos up into the 1980s
- Purchased new archival appropriate metal shelving and installed it with the help of George Faulkner and Steve Saddlemire. Also purchase more appropriate storage boxes for the collection. These were all funded by the UUCWC Endowment Committee
- Helped staff through several projects related to the capital campaign, the Right Relations Covenant, access to digital records, and building and grounds work
- Gave talk to Coming of Age class about our history and UUCWC's place in the denomination
- Supplied information for 6 congregational and staff projects over the past year

#### Key goals for the coming year to fulfill UUCWC's mission

Parker and Charlie, along with the rest of their volunteers, will continue to focus on UUCWC's mission relating our successes in community building and social justice work in the past, to how

we are in the present and what path it all creates to the future. The team will continue to organize paper items into archival storage to insure long term storage and create an ease of access for researchers. They will also continue to accession, identify, and catalog photos so they too will be properly stored and accessible for research.

While organization has been going on for five years under Parker and Charlie's leadership, it is still an on-going task that will not be finished for some time to come. In addition, Parker will maintain and improve her and the congregation's connection to UU history at Meadville-Lombard, Andover-Harvard, and Murray Grove to further improve our standards in history care and knowledge.

Finally, during this coming year, Parker and Charlie want to continue to learn about and implement more up-to-date digital processing and further the work to create an oral history program.

- Delegated more of the administrative, coordinating oversight to more individuals (such as Communications)
- Welcomed four new UUCWC members as team members: Mason Crane-Bolton, Roger and Joan McCloughan and Linda Vogt, all of whom made significant contributions to our smooth operations notably our outreach efforts
- Met the budget targeted amount, and with the carry-over of \$5,000 from prior year, raised \$47,000 net, allowing for 50% of the \$7,000 surplus to be allocated to support social justice programs
- Provided professional outside entertainment as prelude to the Live Auction
- Despite last-minute surge of donated items, we obtained over 300 items for Silent and
  Live Auction events; items included 32 dinners, 78 events/other fixed priced services, 12
  large-capacity events/meals, and in the competitive categories over 41 events or services,
  77 items, 15 art pieces, and 37 gift cards, with a significant number procured by Pauline
  Perkins and Joan McCloughan, 5 raffle baskets and 23 Live Auction items as well as
  numerous like-new items in the boutique

#### Why this group is vital to the life of UUCWC and how it helps to fulfill its mission

The Earth Ministry Team is committed to ensuring environmentally sound practices are implemented by committees/teams and staff utilizing and caring for our facility (grounds and buildings) in keeping with our Green Sanctuary designation by the UUA. We provide information to our congregation about "green" practices for home applications through our Green Info Tables, articles and presentations. Earth Ministry procures the coffee for our Fellowship Coffee Hours; for many, this truly fits the definition of "vital to the life of the congregation." Earth Ministry oversees the planting and harvesting of the food crops in Allie's Garden. Produce was used to feed HomeFront children on tutoring nights and to include in the meals prepared by Food Ministry.

Affiliated and operating independently, outdoor adventure/nature walks were held on the third Sunday afternoon of each month. In addition, an affiliated group provides the care for the "green" (plants) in our Sanctuary and the Crossings Room.

#### Success(es) from the past year

Earth Ministry continued with:

- Sponsoring seasonal Used Book Sales, designating the proceeds from the winter sale for energy conservation and the spring sale for grounds projects at UUCWC; Chris Piatek, Barbara Drew and Penny Rodgers assumed the role, relieving Al Johnson after many years of these sales.
- Conducting twice-monthly Organic products sales including coffee, tea, chocolate and olive oil, with the proceeds enabling the purchase of coffee for the Fellowship Coffee Hour; sales were have been down and accordingly a brief news article was prepared to explain the sales and how proceeds benefit UUCWC; products all derived from small farms enabling them to circumvent marketing channels which lower their profits; all products grown without chemical which can be harmful to the farmers and their communities; twenty cents per pound of product donated from our supplier, Equal Exchange to UU Service Committee (about \$40 this year); Janet Hubbard assumed the responsibility for the sales, relieving Al after many years of running it!
- Advising on issues such as on non-chemical control of insect pests in coordination with Grounds Committee

- Attending seasonal Facilities Management Team meetings and continued to convey recommendations for native plantings on church grounds
- Planting, maintaining and harvesting "Allie's Garden" for HomeFront and Food Ministry purposes, putting our 8<sup>th</sup> principle into action. A late fall harvest yielded 56 pounds of carrots. Cherry tomatoes were bountiful as were other veggies throughout the summer and early Fall; Butternut squashes turned into 8 pies for Homefront's Thanksgiving Meal; Al Johnson continued to oversee this project
- Supporting through church membership the non-profit ISLES, a group which fosters gardening and provides seeds (among other Trenton-area needs), in furtherance of our 8<sup>th</sup> principle
- Earth Ministry prepared or implemented:
  - Application for River-Friendly designation for UUCWC through the Stony Brook Millstone Watershed Association (review still pending)
  - o Potluck and Movie open to congregation, Potlucks with each meeting (open to all)
  - o Mindful Meditation Walk on church grounds (to be rescheduled due to inclement weather on original date)
  - o Earth Day service on 4/14 co-led with Ministerial Intern Hannah Gallo, with slide show and earth, air, water focus by Hannah, Chris Piatek and Al Johnson
  - Received Council for Faith in Action approval to designate the plate collection on Earth Day for Climate Action through UUA Ministry for the Earth, with Earth Ministry funds matching the 50% from the plate (over \$800 combined total donated to UUA Ministry for the Earth)
  - Coordinated with Family Action Ministry (FAM) to seek potential collaborative projects with ISLES in furtherance of our 8<sup>th</sup> principle
  - o Coordinated with FAM regarding legislation for climate/carbon limitations
  - Provided books to FAM for their drive to supply books to prisons thereby reducing the overstock in Earth Ministry's book inventory
  - Coordinated Earth Day cleanup of neighboring streets in conjunction with Friends of Hopewell Valley Open Space, earning money for UUCWC

#### Key goals for the coming year to fulfill UUCWC's mission

Our priority is to increase awareness and application of green practices at UUCWC by congregants and committees – from recycling, composting, "green" cleaning products and reducing waste/disposal products at UUCWC functions to planting native plantings on church grounds.

Changing the world is overwhelming. People don't know where to start. We help them by giving them specific and concrete actions/activities they can take or do to put our 8 Principles into action.

#### Success(es) from the past year

- The Action Table helped 189 congregants make 1,386 elected official contacts (119 New Jerseyans and 70 Pennsylvanians)
- The FAM was honored at the Annual Meeting of over 100 AME congregations in NJ for our work at St. James AME church in Hightstown. We partnered with St. James to put in a library and we currently run an ESL program for undocumented immigrants and their children. Highlights include:
  - o one student passed her citizenship test
  - o two students enrolled at Mercer Country Community College
  - o one student's wife and 3-year-old daughter came up from a detention center at the border and we are helping them seek asylum
- Represented at over twelve protests, rallies, anti-racism conferences and workshops
- Collected nine full boxes of books to donate to the library at a Mercer County Correctional Facility
- Collected 40 + dictionaries (dictionary drive still ongoing) for PA's Books Through Bars organization

The Music Ministry of UUCWC is a strong and vital ministry within the church community. Crossing Chorale celebrates life through music each week at rehearsals and two times a month for worship services. We not only have fun through our music, we are a strong fellowship which creates community by supporting and encouraging members weekly and, hopefully, providing music each week which enhances our worship services through the lyrics and music chosen.

Individual musicians who provide music on alternate Sundays are members and friends from the community. Including them in these meaningful services helps to provide musical expression for other instrumentalists and singers, and to strengthen the connection of the music ministry with the UUCWC community.

#### Success(es) from the past year

- We have five new members in Crossing Chorale and six other new musicians who have offered music in our services.
- Our pianist, Erin Busch, left to pursue her Doctorate in Composition at the University of Pennsylvania after 3 years with us. There was a smooth transition when Steve Ryan joined us in August 2018.
- Members of Crossing Chorale attended a choral workshop led by UU Rev. Jason Shelton at the UU Congregation at Montclair in August. Through this workshop, they were coached in healthy choral singing and sang new UU pieces written by Rev. Shelton to be

used throughout the UU liturgical year. We sang a few of those songs in our Sunday services this year.

- Crossing Chorale answered the call to provide music for more memorial services at UUCWC than in any years prior.
- Programming of music for Sunday services continues to be open and flexible in
  consideration of members' busy schedules and lives. Sundays are planned well in
  advance in order for musicians (most who are amateur musicians, not professionals) to
  rehearse and be prepared. With that said, participation and programming are constantly
  changing due to changes in individuals' schedules, Sunday topics and unforeseen
  circumstances. This flexibility allows for more musicians to be involved and benefit
  from this ministry.
- A former member of the choir, is now living in the Memory Care unit of Arden Courts in Yardley. The choir, including her husband, held one of their rehearsals at Arden Courts for the residents. We hope to do more of this outreach in the future.
- Once again, this year, the Crossing Chorale joined other New Jersey UU congregation choirs and musicians for the *MUUsic Festival*, held at the Princeton congregation this year, which benefits the UU Faith Action NJ program.
- Responding to our new 8<sup>th</sup> Principle and the RJI, Caryl has continued (for the second year) to submit "Our Music Today" to be included in the Crossings II insert of the Order of Services each week. This provides background of the composers, lyricists and performers of the music in order to show the conscious choice of music from different religions, races, genres and cultures with a sensitivity to cultural misappropriation and inclusion.
