## Year in Review 2019 – 2020: Report from the Executive Staff

It seems almost impossible that when looking back on this year, it's only been one year - a year of many joys and sorrows, comings and goings. We began the year welcoming Rev. Sue Goodwin to our staff with a one-year contract in the new position of Assistant Minister of Congregational Life; we said goodbye to our Office Assistant Rachel Hansen in December and welcomed Caryl Tipton into that administrative role through the end of this fiscal year, an addition to Caryl's ministry of providing excellent music, choir and musicians to our church. We welcomed child care provider Linda Hamberg as staff, while pianist Steve Ryan and Sunday Steward Roberto Santiago continued to enhance our church life. Robin Pugh continued to lead Children's and Adult Religious Education with the help of many volunteers, while Susan Irgang moved to full time hours with new bookkeeping and Human Resource responsibilities. We wished a good journey to Rev. Kim as she left on a four-month sabbatical, and we stood by her in support and love during her bereavement leave.

This year, our hearts were saddened with the passing of Vince Stefani, Janet Howe-Smith and Bobbye Galloway, and our hearts ached with sorrow for the Wildszewski family at their loss of Malcolm Wildszewski; these were hard losses felt deeply by our beloved congregation. And the heart and commitment of this congregation to change the world continued to be stretched as our country grapples with outrage, fear and the need for permanent change to racial injustice.

Throughout this year of joys and sorrows and challenges, nothing slowed down. A Congregational Life Council was formed, reimagining Membership, Community Building and other teams' work into a cohesive group that follows the journey from visitor through becoming a member to fuller congregational involvement. Our Council for Faith in Action restructured and expanded to include all groups whose work reaches out in fulfillment of our mission. Phase 2 of the Capital Campaign was successfully launched side by side with a new look from our Stewardship team at how our giving relates to our mission. The Faith Action Ministry offered a Cena Latina dinner, UU the Vote, and ESL classes. Our Right Relations Committee did deep work on covenant creation, while Food Ministry developed closer relationships with those to whom they provide meals. The Personnel Committee reviewed contracts for our new assistant minister position as well as senior minister in line with UUA and UUMA best practices. Archives collaborated with another UU church to research history, while Denominational Affairs kept us in contact with the even broader UU community, including General Assembly (virtual this June with the highest UUCWC attendance in years). Earth Ministry marched for Climate Action, raised funds for Farm Workers Support, and grew organic produce for HomeFront and our Food Ministry. The Finance Committee helped reorganize the work of the Treasurer, Finance Chair and Congregational Administrator, tightened checks and balances, and improved reporting of financial information. Grounds and Building continued to care for our UUCWC home, and Worship Associates incorporated the 8th principle into worship.

And then came the pandemic. Our Caring team reached out to every member, friend and participant by phone to make sure their physical, mental and spiritual needs were met, while also establishing programs to help those fearing food insecurities. Our Social Action Ministry came up with a way to support our annual Loaves and Fishes program during shutdown. The

Stewardship Team's pledge drive was interrupted but still received an 80% response and hopes to reach 100% support of UUCWC. The HomeFront Tutoring Program reached out to their students virtually, and the Communications Team reorganized, helping us stay informed. Adult Religious Education continued to offer its year-long classes virtually. Our Auction team moved that annual major fundraiser online and reached their goal of raising \$37,500. Our Finance Team secured a \$30,000 Payroll Protection Plan forgivable loan to help secure church finances. A Worship Tech team was formed, and, with the help of Worship Associates, our staff created the first of our Virtual Worship services within 48 hours of the closure of the church. Our staff continues to innovate and create connection in a time of distancing, with weekly worship, connection circles, children's chapels, safe musical offerings, and continued stewardship of our building and grounds during the building's closure for the last three months and into the future.

This is just a sampling of the work of this community in the past year, and this annual report catalogues the successes and challenges of 2019-2020. We as individuals, as a congregation and as a world continue to navigate this challenging new reality, temporarily shutting our church doors but not our connection, our work, or our commitment to our mission and to each other.

## Archives Team

## How does your group contribute to the mission of our congregation?

Not only do we provide historical context and factual information about our congregation and congregation members at different points in time, we assist committees with their document storage and organization. Information about our history helps us keep our buildings in working order, supports minister and staff recruitment and their needs, supports the board and committees in their research, and demonstrates our congregation's commitments to our values and mission through storage of committee notes, sermons, programing, and meeting files.

## What were the highlights of this year for your committee/ministry?

We began an ongoing interaction with a historian and volunteer connected to the UU Church of Lancaster who is exploring the history of our first settled minister, Reverend Reeman. Reeman left Lancaster to come to Trenton. In addition, prior to the pandemic shutdown, several people were interested in answers to historic questions and it was evident through both their research and ours that our archives has come a long way in preserving our history and making it available for research.

## What were the challenges this year for your committee/ministry?

The Archives Team leader, Parker Cohen, started a paying job in August 2019 and she is no longer able to attend regular team work sessions on Wednesday mornings. The team is trying to figure out the best way to continue work and get advice and information back and forth with this change. In early 2020, Parker, the team leader, was addressing handwritten and email questions and comments with work on Sundays. In addition, almost all of the archives work must be done in person at the church, so no work has been done since the pandemic forced shutdown.

## How do you re-imagine the coming year for your committee/ministry?

Traditional archives work will need to be reconsidered in the same way that congregational worship will in this new world of mitigation. Paper organization is still necessary and very important, but the need to upload finding aids and documentation should be considered and utilized as budgeting and time allow. We are looking forward to the relaxing of pandemic restrictions that will allow for more regular and enjoyable work to continue.

## **Auction Team**

#### How does your group contribute to the mission of our congregation?

Auction proceeds provide financial support for UUCWC programming. Support of the auction is a church-wide effort, giving people the opportunity to contribute in a fun way. And, auction events draw our congregants together, inside and outside of church, to help build and strengthen community.

#### What were the highlights of this year for your committee/ministry?

Propelled by the COVID-19 health emergency, the annual auction went online for the first time in 2020. This was accomplished on very short notice thanks to the hard work and tech skills of Lynne Quinto, Barbara Drew and Lori O'Neil. The congregation contributed about the same number of items as in previous years and the online bidding was brisk in spite of the pandemic and many unknowns in the coming year. The UUCWC congregation stepped up with outstanding support for the auction, allowing us to reach our fundraising goal of over \$37,500.

#### What were the challenges this year for your committee/ministry?

Planning for the auction was underway when the health crisis emerged. The team made fast decisions and pivoted to the online platform quickly in order to make the auction as successful as possible. Reaching the fundraising goal was more challenging than usual, given the difficulties of social distancing and unknowns about what lies ahead in the next year.

### How do you re-imagine the coming year for your committee/ministry?

After the experience and success of the online auction, the team believes this is how we will conduct future auctions regardless of the health emergency. If the situation allows, we would like to have a culminating event, an end-of-auction celebration with food and fun when we can all gather together to celebrate and enjoy good fellowship. If that is still not possible in 2021, we hope to implement this plan in a future year.

#### **Building Committee**

#### How does your group contribute to the mission of our congregation?

Providing a safe, comfortable, accessable, and attractive environment for members, staff, renters, and visitors.

#### What were the highlights of this year for your committee/ministry?

No water leaks!

No major activities (which should be considered good news), just repairs to the front door and door from Room 103 to outside, replacing lights in the sanctuary and elsewhere, powerwashing the building exterior, and working with the congregational administrator on the transition from having a sexton to using an outside cleaning service.

#### What were the challenges this year for your committee/ministry?

Nothing significant, other than adjusting to the COVID-19 closure in conjunction with the ad hoc team formed to make recommendations.

#### How do you re-imagine the coming year for your committee/ministry?

Since capital campaign renovations should start this fall, and the building will remain closed indefinitely due to the pandemic, we expect to perform just the basic minimal activities needed to maintain the building. However, we will be researching policies, procedures, and materials that may be needed once the building reopens in order to minimize exposure to persons unknowingly affected with the COVID-19 virus.

## **Capital Campaign/Project Steering Committee**

### How does your group contribute to the mission of our congregation?

By facilitating repair and renovation of our church facility, improved access for all with the installation of an elevator, and expanded meeting and storage space, the Steering Committee is helping to ensure that our church is truly a welcoming space in which we can create community, celebrate life, and change the world.

## What were the highlights of this year for your committee/ministry?

Through Phases 1 and 2 of our Capital Campaign, our generous congregation has pledged a total of \$1,115,000 toward the repair and renovation of UUCWC. We estimate that we will need approximately \$1,200,000, but should have actual numbers soon, as we are almost ready to go out to bid for a general contractor.

The Hopewell Township Planning Board memorialized the Resolution of Approval at their June meeting. The drawings are under review by the township and will soon be formally approved (already received verbally) by two other governing agencies.

### What were the challenges this year for your committee/ministry?

The coronavirus pandemic has delayed township reviews/meetings/approvals, and although the architectural plans are nearly finished, we have had challenges with getting the Mechanical / Electrical / Plumbing drawings we require. As a result, we were unable to reach out to contractors in the summer and our timelines have shifted by several months. We are optimistic that we will be able to break ground before year end.

## How do you re-imagine the coming year for your committee/ministry?

We imagine hiring a contractor, seeing through on our plans for repair and renovation, and assuring adequate financing that will not require repayment through annual stewardship funds. Although we expect the construction to be completed in the 2020- 2021 church year, capital pledges extend through 2024. We will continue to oversee fulfillment of pledges and outreach for additional funds should another phase of the campaign be needed.

#### **Communications Team**

## What were the challenges this year for your committee/ministry?

COVID-19 and how to keep the congregation connected with other UU happenings. The challenge increased the utilization of social media which appeared to work fairly effectively.

## How do you re-imagine the coming year for your committee/ministry?

- Work to be more impactful utilizing new tools of communication as we continue to be virtual.
- Expand people's awareness of programs, publications, and opportunities to connect with other UUs through new and widening social media avenues.

#### How does your group contribute to the mission of our congregation?

We very directly implement our 7th principle to respect our environment and address environmental social justice issues by providing meals for HomeFront, scholarships to ISLES and maintaining a membership to ISLES, participating in Climate Action March, sponsoring the informative movie by UUA, *The Condor and The Eagle*.

#### What were the highlights of this year for your committee/ministry?

Continued with:

- Organic product sales and Used Book Sales with proceeds to be applied to enhanced native plantings on church grounds
- Managing the organic garden including involving HomeFront with the planting day; harvest was used for Thanksgiving and other HomeFront meals and Food Ministry, as well as Craft Fair sales; 2020 season has reduced variety due to Covid-19 preventing meals, however, donations will be made to food banks, etc.
- Addressing 7th and 8th principles in our activities
- Participating in Facilities Management Team, coordinating with Grounds and Buildings committees in particular to ensure environmentally sound practices

Initiated:

- Participating in Climate Action marches on 2 days in 2 locations with over 20 individuals each day
- Applying funds raised jointly with Faith Action Ministry to support Farm Workers Support Committee and recommended ISLES as Earth Day service recipient of plate for social justice
- Touring TerraCycle, investigating cooperative ventures for expanding recycling at UUCWC
- Planning special Earth Day 50th anniversary events: 2 movies, *Condor and Eagle* in cooperation with the Faith Action Ministry; Green Info Table on recycling; Mindful Meditation Walk of grounds, Rain Barrel and Native Plantings Workshops
- Preparation of new poster to promote increased awareness and understanding of the organic coffee sold and supplied for Fellowship Hour
- Co-sponsoring of Organic Gardening Class to be held at UUCWC but pivoted to Zoom, providing scholarships to ISLES; due to participation UUCWC received \$300
- Application to The Watershed Institute for River Friendly partnership; we anticipate receiving Gold (highest level) award

• Application for two grants: successful receipt of approximately \$3000 to enhance the parking berms and temporary entrance due to capital construction; with Earth Ministry funds will plant native species for wildlife habitat value and aesthetics while removing invasive plants and reducing mowing

## What were the challenges this year for your committee/ministry?

- Awareness and appreciation for the coffee provided to Fellowship Hour we had a sharp decline in sales.
- Scheduling meetings and activities for our busy congregants is challenging.

## How do you re-imagine the coming year for your committee/ministry?

We will:

- Explore virtual educational opportunities via remote technology and sales of organic products in limited or no-contact format.
- Continue to advocate for Earth Day services in April as well as other times of the year.
- Increase the articles for *CrossCurrents* whenever possible to encourage environmentally sensitive lifestyles in church and in our homes.
- Explore setting up the special recycle boxes offered by TerraCycle.

#### How does your group contribute to the mission of our congregation?

The Endowment Fund is invested through the UUCEF – Unitarian Universalist Common Endowment Fund. When the UUCEF does well for the year, the church's endowment increases its principal value while generating income. A process has been set in place for using the endowment's income for projects that benefit UUCWC in ways not covered by the operating and capital budgets. This contributes to our mission to create a welcoming, caring religious community, celebrate our joys and sorrows, give voice to concerns of injustice and touch the lives of others.

#### What were the highlights of this year for your committee/ministry?

We received funds from the WAKE NOW OUR VISION initiative through the Shelter Rock Congregation as follows. The total amount received was \$13,700 - \$3,425 was sent to UUCEF and \$10,275 was retained in UUCWC's Bank as "reserve funds" primarily to fund the grants approved in Spring, 2020.

The grants awarded included:

- Grounds Committee: Funds for a power mower and two picnic tables;
- Religious Education: A Gaga pit- a specialized play area requested by the Director of Lifespan Religious Education;
- Earth Ministry: Native plantings for post-Capital Campaign construction;
- Growth Through Service program: An on-line site to support connection of members;
- Board of Trustees: A wiki-based computer system to make policies and procedures more user-friendly;
- Racial Justice Ministry: Funds for a noted speaker.

Due to the receipt of the Wake Now Our Vision funds and how well our funds did through the UUCEF, we had more money available than the cost of requests. We agreed unanimously to fund all six requests in the full amounts requested because we believed they were extremely worthy according to our eight UUCWC principles and our mission.

#### What were the challenges this year for your committee/ministry?

We held a Zoom meeting in March (before we had much experience with Zoom) in order to decide which grant requests to approve. We informed the recipients but are sure not all have been able to utilize the funds due to the COVID-19 pandemic (i.e. Racial Justice Ministry speaker). We do know that the Earth Ministry grant for plants around the grounds was utilized.

### How do you re-imagine the coming year for your committee/ministry?

Again the Endowment Committee has co-chairs, one is a new co-chair. The co-chairs will be meeting in February to determine if the fund has increased and if, according to formula, we will be able to offer to committees and groups the availability of funding for grant requests. If funds are available, in early March the entire committee will meet to determine which requests to fund. All of our contacts will be done via Zoom and email since the church is closed due to the COVID-19 pandemic.

## **Faith Action Ministry**

#### How does your group contribute to the mission of our congregation?

#### Creating Community

At the Action Table, people chat and get to know each other. We have heard from a number of people that the presence of the Table in the Crossings Room served as a welcome "landing zone" for newcomers who may feel uncomfortable starting small-talk conversations with strangers, but do feel comfortable meeting people as they have brief informational conversations about the issues at that week's Table.

In our ESL classes, and at our Cena Latina fundraiser, UUCWC teachers/volunteers/attendees were able to build relationships with students and guests.

Now that we are social distancing, we have had the opportunity to create fun and inspiring Zoom gatherings to help keep our community knit together and activated.

#### Chanigng the World

Our many programs are focused on connecting our 8 UU principles to concrete actions people can to take to help others in the community and advocate for just policies at all levels of government.

### What were the highlights of this year for your committee/ministry?

- La Cena Latina fundraising dinner for LALDEF
- Taking action 1,130 times at the weekly Action Table between September 2019 and March 8, 2020
- Planning and working on our UU the Vote activities
- Teaching approximately 30 immigrant students in two ESL classes
- Quickly switching gears due to the pandemic: beginning a new weekly Actions from Home email; collecting donations to support our ESL students and their families; collecting mask donations for Henry J. Austin Health Center; focusing on letter- and post-card-writing from home for UU the Vote
- Holding FAM Zoom gatherings to work on our UU the Vote projects -- and more to come!

#### What were the challenges this year for your committee/ministry?

Our biggest challenge was the sudden, and of course, necessary shift to social distancing, and figuring out how to adapt our ongoing efforts, or to change to new efforts because of the pandemic.

#### How do you re-imagine the coming year for your committee/ministry?

The coming year will obviously be very different with the pandemic and necessity of maintaining social distancing. We plan on having at least monthly virtual events, and possibly more frequently in September and October. We will need to respond to events and community needs as they emerge, with the flexibility to change plans, end previous plans and start new ones midstream.

In addition, we are confronting unprecedented crisis in our democracy. This will be the most important election of our lives, and so many of the actions we will take this summer and fall will be focused on our UU the Vote activities, as opposed to legislative advocacy.

And that is just through the beginning of November. No matter what the election results are, our country will be in deeply perilous waters for at least three months in the best case scenario, and for the next 4+ years in the worst case. FAM can be a critical supportive ministry for the UUCWC community in both cases, enabling UUCWC itself to be a critical source of support for our larger community in Bucks County, PA and Mercer County, NJ.

## Faith Expression and Funding Team

## How does your group contribute to the mission of our congregation?

The Faith Expression and Funding Team is part of the Council for Faith in Action, and focuses on two key areas to support UUCWC's eight principles and community justice work. A) Financial: includes overseeing the allocation of the 50% of the plate designated for social justice, and identifying and vetting new funding opportunities that are in line with UUCWC's mission and our UU principles; and B) Public Expression: Internal includes reporting on distribution of plate funds and to coordinate communications to share information on UUCWC's justice ministries and facilitate congregants' involvement with these ministries; External includes facilitating and coordinating opportunities for public statements, providing basic information to appropriate people to respond.

## What were the highlights of this year for your committee/ministry?

With the restructuring of the Council for Faith in Action (CFA), the Faith Expression and Funding Team (FEFT) was established this year. This Team is one of the elements that comprise the Council. Others currently include: Faith Action Ministry, Racial Justice Ministry, Social Action Ministry. Other groups will continue to be encouraged to become part of the Council.

## What were the challenges this year for your committee/ministry?

Challenges included increasing clarity of what FEFT is and visibility within UUCWC, and how to use our resources to best respond to the need during this pandemic.

## How do you re-imagine the coming year for your committee/ministry?

We will continue to look for ways to make the best possible use of our resources to fulfill UUCWC's mission and principles during the uncertain times ahead. Additionally we will work with CFA as a whole to determine how to best utilize our funds to make the most impact within our communities.

## **Food Ministry**

#### How does your group contribute to the mission of our congregation?

As an outreach of Social Justice projects the Food Ministry provides free and nutritious meals for people in need in the local community and within our own church community. The Food Ministry meals are provided from the generous donations of food products and financial assistance from the members of the UUCWC congregation.

#### What were the highlights of this year for your committee/ministry?

The Food Ministry has developed a closer relationship with our recipients through direct contact with the people we serve. We have visited the serving locations and shared time listening to their needs and requests.

#### What were the challenges this year for your committee/ministry?

The current COVID situation has challenged the Food Ministry to rethink the methods used to supply nutritious meals to our recipients. While the church kitchen is inaccessible we have supplied individual meal bags that are shelf stable in place of the cooked meals. This allows the Food Ministry to provide meals in a safe, no-contact environment. We are exploring other methods of meeting our clients' needs as well as expanding our reach to better help serve our community.

### How do you re-imagine the coming year for your committee/ministry?

The current pandemic and the planned church renovation poses serious challenges for the Food Ministry. We have to do our research and listen to the community we serve to provide assistance in a safe and effective manner.

## How does your group contribute to the mission of our congregation?

Grounds promotes our mission by providing a friendly, earth-centered space for people to reflect on their individual spirituality while allowing community with their fellow congregants. It provides a space to experience the wonders of our earth and set an example for taking this environment out into our community.

## What were the highlights of this year for your committee/ministry?

This has been a relatively quiet year. The small group of "gardeners" were able to keep up with the ongoing maintenance of the flower beds with the mowing being performed by an outside company. The Grounds Committee worked with Earth Ministry to submit a grant request to Bowman Hill Wildlife Preserve for additonal plantings on the church property, and have recieved positive feedback. Again working with Earth Ministry we applied for a River Friendly designation from the Watershed Institute and are awaiting a final response. Grounds received a grant from UUCWC Endowment to purchase two picnic tables to be located on the church grounds. Finally, Grounds has begun the process of assimilating the Memorial Garden effort into their operation, including identifying the memorial trees onsite and having plaques made with the individuals' names and years of death.

## What were the challenges this year for your committee/ministry?

The greatest challange this year was the maintenance of the new pervious paved parking area. There was considerable discussion about what could be done to prevent wash outs and damage from vehicle tires. With the expansion project about to kick off any major effort on the erosion issue will be on hold. The vehicle traffic will be addressed with newly purchased barriers. A second challange has been attempts to get greater congregational involvment in the grounds "environment." While the pandemic has all but eliminated congregants from coming onsite, there needs to be a greater effort to get people to enjoy our beautiful grounds, trails and soon-tobe picnic area.

## What were the highlights of this year for your committee/ministry?

A highlight for the SA committee, was that that we were able to support Loaves and Fishes despite Covid-19 restrictions. UUCWC and the UU Princeton Congregation were able to purchase box lunches. UUCWC provided juice and brownies baked by our members. All were given to clients of Loaves and Fishes in Trenton. We didn't think we could meet our commitment to Loaves and Fishes but some creative thinking and funding from our congregation helped us to fulfill our commitment.

## What were the challenges this year for your committee/ministry?

The Covid-19 Pandemic presented a challenge that we've never faced in living memory. The social distancing and other restrictions were just going into effect when we would normally be purchasing food for Loaves and Fishes. These restrictions cut to the heart of Loaves and Fishes during which we actually see and interact with those we are helping. We were heartened that while most of our typical volunteers were not able to participate, the Loaves and Fishes clients were glad to receive the much needed food that we provided, without the personal touch.

## How do you re-imagine the coming year for your committee/ministry?

- We were able to re-imagine Loaves and Fishes in 2020. Next year will present similar challenges. Will the back to school drive require different items due to the possible continuation of virtual schooling?
- Will we be able to obtain Turkeys for Task if the disruption to the supply chain to supermarkets continues?
- We'll have to re-imagine our support no matter how the world changes in the coming year.

#### **Stewardship Committee**

#### How does your group contribute to the mission of our congregation?

The Stewardship Committee contributes to UUCWC by ensuring we have the financial resources needed to live our mission to "Create Community, Celebrate Life, and Change the World." The congregation's contributions are essential in funding the Sunday services, religious education programs, community outreach, as well as basic necessities likes maintenance for our beloved church building.

#### What were the highlights of this year for your committee/ministry?

The congregation has done an amazing job contributing to the financial health of UUCWC. We created a new "Gingerbread House" theme for the year-end give, and as a congregation raised \$19.2K, a 22% increase from prior year. For the annual stewardship campaign, we created a new pledge booklet to better explain how financial contributions support the congregation; it was well received. So far, we have received \$380K in pledges for fiscal year 20/21 from 80% of those expected to pledge, which is on par with last year from that same group. It was also a new year for us to try the collaborative leadership model for the committee.

#### What were the challenges this year for your committee/ministry?

The \$380K in pledges for FY20/21 is short of the \$419k goal we set and which we are hopeful of reaching. This is largely because it has been impossible to connect with the last 20% of prospective pledgers, something that would normally be done at services, face-to-face. Additionally, there has been a certain reluctance in some cases to commit, due to the uncertainty caused by the COVID-19 financial upheaval. We will continue to request pledges from those we have not yet heard from. We hope to achieve a 100% response.

### How do you re-imagine the coming year for your committee/ministry?

We plan to continue the collaborative leadership model, and to build upon the new things we tried this year (i.e., the new year-end theme, stewardship informational booklet). We will plan contingencies in how to maintain pledge collection and new pledges in our current environment.

The state of the finances of UUCWC is sound. We completed the fiscal (June 30, 2020) with an approximate \$49,000 surplus on a budget that was scheduled for a -\$1,026 deficit.

We maintained our staff at 100% throughout the year and from March till June, we maintained paying all part time staff at the rate they would have been paid if we were not closed. And of course, all full-time staff remained on payroll throughout the closure.

Expenses showed some savings based on the milder than usual winter along with the suspension of in-building activity due to COVID-19. Note that savings were in the area of facilities operations at 73% of budget, and programming at 70% of budget. Personnel and other fixed expenses (insurance, copier lease, mortgage, and even utilities were on or close to budget.

Income overall was up 1.35% over budget. The Auction was another overwhelming success and our fundraising income with pledges contributed to this increase.

Additionally, WAs adapted to changes in service components and delivery when UUCWC moved to the zoom platform for service delivery.

#### How do you re-imagine the coming year for your committee/ministry?

In the 2021 church year, the WA ministry will be recruiting and training new members. We will continue to work on incorporating the 8th principle into our worship services. We expect to begin group reading and discussion of the book "Centering" during our monthly meetings. We will continue to adapt to the zoom platform, as each member learns the technology and adapts to the changes required by the technology.
